MI & OH Students Demonstrate Japanese

Skills in Online Statewide Contests

During February and March, students of Japanese in Michigan and Ohio will have several opportunities to demonstrate their knowledge of Japanese language and culture. The Michigan Japanese Language Speech Contest, Ohio Japanese Speech Contest, Ohio Japan Bowl, and Michigan Japanese Culture Festival will all be taking place online this year.

On Sat., Feb. 20, the Michigan Japanese Language Speech Contest will feature high school student competition in the morning, and college/university student competition in the afternoon. Both will be viewable by the public via the Consulate's <u>YouTube channel</u>. The <u>application</u> deadline has been extended to 5:00pm on Feb. 10.

On Sat., March 13, the Ohio Japanese Speech Contest will include participants in the high school, university, and "advanced" (post-college) categories. The <u>application</u> deadline is 5:00pm on Feb. 5.

On Sat., March 6, teams from intermediate- to advanced-level high school Japanese classes will participate online in the <u>2021 Ohio</u> <u>Japan Bowl</u>. Team applications must be submitted by Fri., Feb. 12.



MEXT Scholarship Deadline Nears

The deadline for submitting an application for the MEXT Japanese Studies Scholarship is 5:00pm on Monday, February 22. This scholarship offers undergraduates majoring in a field related to Japanese language and/or culture the opportunity to study in Japan for a period of one year.

Setsubun Holiday Brings in Good Luck and

Sends Away the Bad

Each February in Japan, the holiday known as Setsubun (literally, "seasonal division") marks the end of winter and the coming of spring with various traditional activities intended to usher in good fortune and send evil spirits away.

One tradition, known as *mame-maki*, or "bean throwing," involves tossing roasted soybeans around one's home and/or at people wearing masks to represent *oni*, evil spirits or demons. Those throwing the beans usually chant, "Oni wa soto! Fuku wa uchi!" meaning "Out with the demons! In with good fortune!"

Setsubun usually occurs on February 2nd or 3rd, according to the traditional lunar calendar. This year, Setsubun occurred on the 2nd day of the 2nd month for the first time since 1897.
