May 5th in Japan. The holiday is a celebration of the healthy growth and happiness of children. Families mark the occasion by hanging koi streamers called

Koi are a symbol of strength because of their ability to fight their way through powerful waterfalls. Koinobori represent the desire for children to become brave and strong individuals.
