

Also known as the "Star Festival," Tanabata is based on the legend of two star-crossed lovers who are allowed to meet only once every year. As explained in the video on our YouTube channel, one popular Tanabata tradition involves committing one's wishes to writing and public display, in the form of *tanzaku*.

In early July, several organizations are providing opportunities for local youngsters to try their hands at making tanzaku and other Tanabata-themed crafts.
