#### Sakura Mochi: Japan's Spring Treat



In Japan, the arrival of spring is marked with the enjoyment of cherry blossoms (or *sakura*) and a special traditional sweet known as *sakura mochi*. These treats are made of pink-colored rice cakes *(mochi)* filled with sweet red bean paste *(anko)*, and wrapped in a cherry tree leaf.

There are different styles of *sakura mochi* in different regions of Japan. Cherry-blossom viewers in the city of Omiya, in Ohio's sister-state of Saitama (pictured below left), are likely to enjoy the more crepe-like *sakura mochi* of the Kantō region. Michigan's sister-state of Shiga is in the Kansai region, so on the Kaizu Osaki peninsula in Shiga (pictured below right), one is likely to find the chewier rice-ball type of *sakura mochi*.



Places to enjoy *o-hanami* (blossom viewing) in Michigan include Belle Isle in Detroit, Meijer Gardens in Grand Rapids, and Old Mission Peninsula in Traverse City. In Ohio, popular *o-hanami* spots include Akron, Athens, Bowling Green, Cleveland, Columbus, Dayton, Dublin, and Newark. The first <u>Columbus Cherry Blossom</u> <u>Festival</u> will be held this April.

### Japanese Language Learners Shine in Michigan and Ohio Contests



#### **Consul General Shindo Travels to Cleveland**



On March 22, Consul General Shindo made a presentation at an event hosted by <u>Global Cleveland</u>, as part of their Ambassador and Diplomat Series program. The Consul General also paid a visit to Cleveland City Hall to meet Mayor Justin M. Bibb. Afterwards, he stopped at the Cleveland Museum of Art to "meet" the friendship doll known as Miss Gifu. She is one of 58 "friendship dolls" (*tōrei ningyō*) sent to the U.S. from Japan in 1927 as a gesture of goodwill. Representing Gifu Prefecture, she returned there temporarily for repairs in 1995.

#### "Business Update" Marks 45th Anniversary of Honda Activities in Ohio
