Season of New Tea and Special Sweets



May 5 is Children's Day, or "Kodomo no Hi," one of several consecutive holidays that comprise "Golden Week" in early May. In addition to displays of samurai helmets and colorful carp-shaped banners, celebrating Children's Day in Japan includes eating kashiwa mochi, sweet rice cakes filled with anko (red bean paste) and wrapped in kashiwa (oak) leaves. The oak leaves are considered a symbol of the prosperity of one's descendants, since oak trees don't shed old leaves until new leaves grow.



In Japan, May is also the time of year when the first green tea leaves are ready for harvest, as celebrated in the traditional children's song, "Chatsumi" (or "Tea Harvest"). The tea harvest extends from May to October, but the tea made from the first spring shoots, called "shincha" or "new tea," is prized for its particular flavor and health benefits.

Tea plants are believed to store up the amino acid theanine and nutrients other during their winter dormancy period. Traditionally, drinking shincha harvested on "hachijuu-hachiya," or the "88th night" from beginning of spring, is believed to bring good health throughout the following year. Michigan's sister-state of Shiga is known for producing a tea called "Omi-cha," and Ohio's sisterstate of Saitama is known for "Sayama-cha."

Asian American Heritage Month Events Abound in Michigan and Ohio

May is Asian American Pacific Islander Heritage Month, and a wide variety of organizations in Michigan and Ohio are holding special events around that theme. In addition to the Asian Food Fest in downtown Cincinnati on May 7-8 and the Cleveland Asian Festival on May 21-22, Dayton Metro Library is hosting a variety of speakers and performances throughout the month, including a Japanese taiko drumming concert on May 7. In Michigan, the Detroit Institute of Arts is hosting a weekend of performances, including folk stories from Japan, on May 18-19, and Novi Public Library's AAPI Heritage Month programs include storytelling, origami crafts, tea tasting, and an anime matinee.
