### **Japan's Umbrella Culture Keeps Evolving**



June in Japan is a time of frequent rainy days. It is no wonder that umbrellas, or *kasa*, have played an important part in Japanese culture for centuries. The making of traditional Japanese umbrellas, or *wagasa* (above left), using single stalks of bamboo and oiled paper, has been designated an "intangible cultural asset," with only a handful of artisans remaining.

Umbrellas in Japan have become more much high-tech, including those made of ultra-lightweight material weighing less than a cell phone, those equipped with tracking devices in case they are misplaced, hands-free "drone" umbrellas that hover above one's head, and umbrellas made of special water-repellent material that reveal decorative patterns when wet (above right).



Outdoor artistic displays of umbrellas have become popular in Japan. First popularized at an art festival in Portugal, "umbrella sky" displays can now be found in various public spots in Japan, including an outdoor shopping area in Kusatsu, Shiga prefecture (above left), and Moominvalley animation theme park in Saitama prefecture (above right).

#### Koi Festival on Belle Isle Draws Over 2000




On May 1, the Belle Isle Conservancy hosted the Koi Festival on site for the first time since 2019, and drew more than 2000 attendees. This spring celebration of Belle Isle Aquarium's collection of *koi*, or Japanese carp, featured performances by Ensemble Hanabi, Great Lakes Taiko, and Sakura Japanese Instrumental Group, plus *kamishibai* storytelling by the Japan Society of Detroit Women's Club. Streetside Sushi provided a food truck, and the Great Lakes JET Alumni Association and our Consulate hosted children's activity tables.

Detroit's Belle Isle Park, the second most-visited state park in the U.S., has numerous blossoming cherry trees and a stone plaque commemorating the sister-city relationship between Detroit and Toyota (Aichi prefecture) which began in 1960. 
