#### Winter is a Time for Fun in Saitama & Shiga

In Japan, summer and fall may be popular seasons for festivals and outdoor activities, but winter also has its own special events. Every January in Michigan's sister-state of Shiga, Ōmi Jingū shrine in Ōtsu hosts the Karuta Festival (below left), including a national tournament of the competitive *karuta* card game. The shrine is dedicated to Emperor Tenji, author of the first *tanka* poem of the *Ogura Hyakunin Isshu* poetry collection that forms the basis of the *karuta* game. In Ohio's sister state of Saitama, the Otaki Ice Festival in Chichibu-Tama-Kai National Park features nighttime illuminations of the massive Misotsuchi Icicles on the Arakawa River (below right). This naturally-made wall of icicles, measuring over 30 meters wide and 10 meters high, forms into different shapes each year.

In November, alumni from the Japan Exchange & Teaching (JET) Program attended a Welcome Back Reception (pictured below), hosted by Consul General Shindo at his residence, for the first time since the pandemic. # SPOTLIGHT ON INTERNATIONAL LEADER FROM OHIO

### **JASCO Names New Executive Director**

The Japan America Society of Central Ohio (JASCO) recently selected Mr. Seth Josolowitz as its new Executive Director. A native of Columbus, Mr. Josolowitz worked closely with elected officials and community groups as a political consultant for nearly a decade before joining JASCO. He first became interested in international exchange while in high school, when a friend's mother recruited him to show around a group of exchange students from Japan. This inspired him to become an exchange student himself at age 17, spending a year in Japan, and eventually earning a Bachelor of Arts degree from Waseda University in Tokyo. After such experiences, Mr. Josolowitz says, "It was only natural for me to want to facilitate cultural relations between the two countries I love."



One of Mr. Josolowitz's most significant memories of his first visit to Japan was the *bunkasai*, or "culture festival," held at his Japanese high school. He recalls being "amazed at how my fellow high school students were able to organize such a huge school-wide festival with zero teacher support...The level of cooperation, planning, execution, and professionalism was way beyond anything I had ever experienced at my U.S. high school."

As Executive Director of JASCO, Mr. Josolowitz notes that the organization has done a "phenomenal job" over the past 26 years introducing Japanese culture to thousands of people in Central Ohio, and he is eager to collaborate with local partners to expand such activity in Northwest and Northeast Ohio as well. He is also hoping to begin hosting accessible, affordable trips to Japan so more Americans can experience Japanese food and culture firsthand.
