JASYP Japanese Job Fair 2025





The 2025 Japanese Job Fair was held on February 6th at the Novi Civic Center in Novi, Michigan. This annual event, hosted by the Japan America Society of Michigan & Southwestern Ontario Young Professionals (JASYP) in partnership with Great Lakes JETAA, continues to serve as a vital platform for connecting talented professionals with companies seeking individuals with Japanese-English language skills and cross-cultural expertise.

City of Novi Mayor Justin Fischer welcomed attendees with an inspiring speech, emphasizing the importance of creating career pathways through the connections made at the job fair. At the end of the day, he was so pleased with the meaningful outcome that he will book the same Novi Civic Center for next year's Job Fair on February 5th, 2026.

This year's event, themed "Bridging Cultures, Bridging Futures: Shaping Tomorrow's Workforce through Japanese-American Synergies," was led by JASMSO President Liseann Gouin, Great Lakes JETAA President Alicia Smith, Ikigai Connections Founder Kasia Lynch, JASYP President Areen Rizq, and JASYP Strategic Advisor Michele Plattenberger, who welcomed 23 companies seeking professionals across various industries, offering job seekers opportunities to engage directly with Japanese businesses.

Shiga Visiting Official Keiko Nakajima spoke about Michigan and Shiga's long-standing sister-state relationship and the importance of their connection. JBSD President Sasaki Shin also dropped by, reaffirming the growing interest of Japanese businesses in engaging with international talent.

Cresswell, co-hosts of the "Opera Out of the Box" podcast, featured a thought-provoking panel discussion followed by a lively Q&A session, as well as an incredible vocal performance by singers Sarah Rachael Bacani, Robbie Raso, Emily Cotton, and Brady Delvecchio.

Consul General Kishimori, alongside esteemed panelists Japanese American Citizens League Detroit Chapter Treasurer Mary Kamidoi, Japanese WWII "War Bride" Keiko Hahn, and Bowling Green State University Professor Emerita Akiko Kawano-Jones, delved into the stories of resilience and identity among Japanese Americans during WWII. The discussion also shed light on the evolving historical relationship between Japan and the United States and its relevance to fostering mutual understanding and collaboration in today's interconnected world.
